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Advancing the Mission

When Dr. Frank Hayden began the research that started the world-wide Special Olympics movement, no one could have envisioned how powerful and successful this mission would become.

Enriching the lives of people with an intellectual disability through sport.

Seems simple enough but forty years ago and even today, people with an intellectual disability can become marginalized and in some ways discounted within their own communities. Special Olympics, through sport, have opened up a new world for those who participate and for those who support. Whether you choose to coach or volunteer to help in some other capacity, the collective effort advances the whole movement.

Real Competition

Special Olympics Ontario has sixteen core sports including swimming, bowling (5 & 10 pin), floor hockey, power lifting, soccer, softball, track & field, speed skating, alpine skiing, Nordic skiing, and snowshoeing. Special Olympics Ontario also runs programs in other sports such as basketball, rhythmic gymnastics and curling.

Special Olympics provides athletes with an intellectual disability the opportunity to experience and succeed in sport. Special Olympics athletes gain self confidence and transfer the success from playing the field to become more active citizens in society.

Real Sport

Special Olympics is not an event that takes place once every four years. There are hundreds of Special Olympics' programs throughout the province which provide athletes with the opportunity to train twelve months of the year. Special Olympics athletes train and compete at community and regional events and have the opportunity to be selected to advance to the Provincial level competition. Just like other great Canadian athletes, Special Olympics athletes also have the opportunity to advance to National and International Competition every four years.
